Project Description

Methods: Please describe the specific activities of this project.

The specific activities of this project include public outreach events in Livingston within Park County and will address specific priorities during targeted public outreach campaigns including development issues and NPS prevention measures associated with the relatively unpolluted waters of the Shields Valley Watershed; and, educational presentations to middle school students regarding area geology and watershed concerns, NPS pollution and oil and gas industry impacts - both environmentally and economically. The project is designed to promote long-term, substantial changes in behavior to reduce NPS pollution through effective education.

Objectives: Please describe the specific/measurable objectives that will ensure the achievement of the project goal(s).

The project addresses the NPS education and outreach goals for developing and implementing educational campaigns and expanding watershed and NPS awareness in the community and local middle school. Anticipated objectives of the Park County Natural Resource Education and Outreach Program include development, implementation and facilitation of three public outreach workshops (one per year) and three middle school presentations (one per year) over the course of the proposed three-year project period. The goal is to provide information (orally, with handouts and web links) to at least 40 attendees at each of the public workshops (120 minimum for total project period).

Overview: Please provide a brief summary of the proposed project.

Impacts of oil and gas development on water quality are a growing concern across much of the United States. As bordering states increase oil and gas production and test wells continue to be drilled in various parts of Montana, area and regional concerns have grown prevalent in the Park County area. Stormwater runoff from construction activities, the volume and contamination of the water used during hydraulic fracturing and pollution from leaking pits used for storage of the fracking water used during the extraction of natural gas are of particular concern, especially as it effects the Shields Valley Watershed. Public relations outreach programs and presentations will be designed to address all significant sources of NPS pollution with special emphasis on oil and gas extraction, best management practices as well as the significance and viability of the oil and gas industry in Montana. Collaboration between several interested stakeholders will bring strength and expertise to the development and implementation of this project. Information from current and future baseline water quality sampling projects in the Shields Valley Watershed with data currently being collected by the Montana Bureau of Mines and Geology will be utilized at public meeting workshops as well as in middle school presentations. Other collaborators and contributors to this project will include Joe Brooks Chapter of Trout Unlimited, Park County and Wildlife Conservation Society. Industry experts from the oil and gas industry, including Bill Barrett Corporation and Devon Energy, will also be asked to provide advisory and speaking representatives to participate in forums to communicate the essential role the industry plays and current best management practices associated with balancing pollution and natural resource protection while providing energy and products that contribute to economic growth. Letters in support of, and commitment to this project, from various stakeholders, are included as an attachment to this application. At the present time, the Shields Valley Watershed Group (SVWG) is working in conjunction with the Bureau of Mines and Geology at Montana Tech to conduct baseline groundwater monitoring through the Groundwater Assessment Program, the Groundwater Characterization Program and supplemental grants to be applied for by SVWG. Year 1 workshops and presentations will introduce the sampling processes and a summary of any findings to date. Year 2 presentations will include preliminary results analysis from sampling data. Year 3 presentations will include final results of sampling efforts. A project area map is included as an attachment to this application.

Section II: Background Information

A: Statement of Need and Intent

To many in the west, energy development is old news. Indeed many Montanans have seen oil rigs and coalbed methane pads come and go through the years. Until now, energy development has been relatively isolated in the Northern Rockies, with Wyoming seeing the most intensive development. Current prices of crude oil has made other fuels more competitive; the value of natural gas is steadily climbing and its market is expanding making it attractive for investment by big energy firms looking to diversify from oil. Park County is not immune to energy development, and the Shields Valley may be particularly at risk for natural gas exploration. An oil shale deposit located more than 9,000 feet below the surface is now fair game for drilling due to more efficient and effective recovery techniques. Two energy companies have expressed enough interest in this area to purchase leasing rights, and one well has been discovered to produce a significant and marketable quantity of natural gas. Advancements in technology have made gas more accessible including fracking (hydraulic fracturing) and horizontal drilling. Due to a Bush-era exemption under the Safe Drinking Water Act, companies are not required to disclose the chemical makeup of the fracking fluid they use. Extraction pollution issues include environmental impacts of industry-produced water that is reinjected into the ground; chemicals used in well development; outputs of well maintenance products; some habitat modification when vegetation along stream banks and in watershed areas is diminished or eliminated due to production pad infrastructure construction; and, runoff from production pad and infrastructure construction activities.

PCEC is currently working with County officials to make sure any development that takes place in Park County does not negatively impact wildlife, watershed and general quality of life. The proposed education and outreach project is important to water quality issues because it will educate community members and future generation students about non-point source pollution and enable them to relate land uses to water quality impacts, identify appropriate land uses to protect water quality and explains how land use decisions affect water quality. This type of societal marketing ensures environmental protection that will preserve societies as well as the environment. The outreach components will serve to educate public parties on the need to protect remaining healthy watersheds and prevent impacts to aquatic ecosystems from land use changes and other environmental impacts.

In addition to support through staff, publicity, political influence and financial resources, established partnerships for this project will provide access to resources, increase effectiveness, efficiency and public influence and improve communication between potentially adversarial parties.

Additional Information (Planning and Management)

PCEC has the fiscal capacity to manage the Park County Natural Resource Outreach and Education Program. PCEC is experienced in preparing project management plans, establishing and maintaining project files, adhering to project budgets and timelines, processing payment requests, preparing project progress, expenditure and closeout reports and satisfying funding agency guidelines. PCEC has a long history of sound fiscal management, follows generally accepted accounting principles and conducts yearly financial audits.

Management of the project and implementation of activities will be directed by Kerry Fee, Executive Director for PCEC. Kerry has over fifteen years of environmental experience and has also worked with Joe Brooks Trout Unlimited where he currently serves as a board member. Kristen Wester will provide leadership for all financial management and reporting activities. Kristen earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Marketing and Accounting from Montana State University and has served as program and grants manager for various environmental projects for over fourteen years.

Section III: Project Components

A: Education and Outreach: Please briefly describe the education and outreach component of this proposal and the target audience.

Two education and outreach components of this project include a public outreach workshop once per year in the each of the three years of the project period. These outreach events are designed to promote long-term, substantial changes in behavior to reduce non-point source pollution. The target audience of these meetings will include civic group representatives, environmental and watershed agency officials, industry representatives, landowners and community members. Influencing attitudes and behaviors by educating future generations is one of the more effective methods for environmental advocacy. Classroom presentations at the local middle school will occur once per year in each of the three years of the project period targeting middle school science students.

Community outreach components of this project will also include preparation and submission of project update reports, in the form of written public announcements, to the Livingston Enterprise, the Montana Pioneer and Livingston Current newspapers as well as the Sleeping Giant Middle School newsletter. Website updates and presentation links will be provided by PCEC staff and Park County information technology staff and will include links on the following websites: Park County, Park County Environmental Council, Sleeping Giant Middle School and Wildlife Conservation Society. Other websites that express interest in links and posting of the outreach events, literature and sessions will be added as requested.

Virtual/electronic event materials will be utilized at all outreach events versus hard copies, where practicable.

C: Operation and Maintenance

Project outreach event information - both for upcoming meetings and presentations and summaries of past meetings and presentations - will be included in a unique page on the Park County website and linked to project collaborator websites. Media updates will include opinion editorials, press releases and public service announcements. Materials will be available for civic clubs, schools and other interested stakeholders and parties. PCEC and Park County information technology staff will maintain and update the Park County Natural Resources Education and Outreach Program page and link to other project collaborator websites.

Management and administration of the project and implementation of activities will be directed by Kerry Fee, Executive Director for PCEC. Kerry has over fifteen years of environmental experience and has also worked with Joe Brooks Trout Unlimited where he still serves as a board member. Kristen Wester will provide leadership for all financial management and reporting activities. Kristen earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Marketing and Accounting from Montana State University and has served as program and grants manager for various environmental projects for over fourteen years.

D: Monitoring: Please briefly describe the monitoring component of this proposal.

Although actual sampling will not be performed as a part of this funding request for assistance, the results from the Shields Valley watershed area quality monitoring to be gathered beginning this fall will be a major component of information presented at workshops and presentations. At each workshop and middle school presentation, pre-sampling information, preliminary data and final data will be highlighted based on the level of completeness on sampling efforts at the time of the presentations. Three sets of workshops and presentations for the three-year project period will allow for dissemination of all sampling results and forum discussion topics regarding results and NPS concerns with oil and gas extraction.

Public perception and/or knowledge gained through outreach events will be monitored through brief questionnaires to adequately prepare for future project period presentations and handout materials, and for use in future projects and programs. Continually adapting elements from those results will allow PCEC to know what worked and why and to build on the successes or make adjustments for future presentations.

Section IV: Scope of Work

Task 1 Title Public Outreach Workshop Preparation, Implementation and Facilitation

Description

Development, implementation, planning and facilitation of a one-half day workshop to include a two-hour forum with industry and agency officials, landowners and stakeholders; two half-hour presentations by agency experts; and one hour of social networking activities. Refreshments, handouts and links to presentation materials will be provided. Video recording of all workshop events will be posted to the unique Park County Natural Resource Education and Outreach page and linked to all other project collaborators and partners. The workshop location will be in Livingston, Montana, held near the end of September, for three project years.

Deliverables

PCEC will produce literature (agendas, speaker presentations, forum discussion notes, etc.) for outreach events, available both through paper copies and electronic versions. All literature will be available via website postings and links and through hard copies available at the outreach events. Video recordings of the outreach events will also be posted to Park County and PCEC websites, and will be made available to any other interested parties and/or agencies.






Project Area Map
